II. Course Description

Class/Lab/Credit: 3/0/3

This course provides a comprehensive study of diatonic harmony. Emphasis is placed on voice leading tasks, part writing, and analysis using various labeling systems. Upon completion, students should be able to demonstrate harmonic principles through four-voice part writing, recognize and label non-harmonic tones, analyze chords using Roman numerals, figured bass, and lead sheet symbols, and classify small-scale phrase structure and cadence types. *This course has been approved for transfer under the CAA and ICAA as a premajor and/or elective course requirement.*

III. Prerequisite(s): MUS 121 and MUS 151D, or appropriate placement score Corequisite(s): None

IV. Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- o Demonstrate principles of appropriate voice leading through four-voice part writing of diatonic triads and seventh chords in root position and inversion.
- O Diagram the phrase structure of musical excerpts.
- o Compose bass lines and one-to-one counterpoint to given progressions.
- Analyze and critique contrapuntal one-to-one voice movement.
- o Recognize and label non-chord tones within a musical passage.
- O Compose an original work demonstrating concepts of part writing, voice leading, phrase structure, and proper notation practices within the Western art music tradition.
- O Analyze excerpts from the standard classical repertoire using Roman numerals, figured bass symbols, and lead sheet symbols.
- o Analyze and notate secondary dominant chords.

VII. Attendance Policy

Coastal Carolina Community College is committed to the principle that class attendance is an essential part of its educational program. The student may ask to be reinstated into the course if disenrolled. However, reinstatement decisions are left to the instructor and only provided in the event of extenuating circumstances.

VIII. Methods of Evaluation and Grading Criteria

Final grades will be determined by the following categories: Micro-Assessments (quizzes, homework, and study sessions): 35%

2 Exams (15% each): 30% Composition Project: 15%

Comprehensive Final Exam: 20%

Study Sessions

Students should attend at least two instructor-led study sessions during the semester, which will occur at various scheduled times outside class time. In order to receive full credit, the student should attend at least 20 minutes of the session. Study session attendance will count as micro-assessment grades.

Micro-Assessments

- O Quizzes will be given in class to assess student comprehension of the material.
- O Homework assignments are due at the beginning of class time. If the student knows they will be absent from class on a due date, the assignment must be submitted to the instructor early to receive credit. Scanned and emailed assignments will be accepted if the student is unable to attend class on the due date of an assignment as long as it is received by class time.
- The instructor will not accept late homework assignments and will not provide make up quizzes.
- O To account for unexpected circumstances and absences, the lowest three micro-assessments will be dropped.

Exams

No make-up exams will be given unless the student notifies the instructor prior to the exam and receives written approval from the instructor.

Composition Project

Students will demonstrate mastery of concepts in music theory, particularly focusing on Chapters 7 through 15 from the textbook, by composing an original work for 4-part SATB a cappella choir or SATB choir with an instrumental or vocal soloist. Members of the class will read projects during class time.

Comprehensive Final Exam

The final exam will be Wednesday, May 8 from 8:00 to 9:50AM. The final exam covers content from chapters 7 through 16 in the textbook. The final exam may not be taken any time other than the assigned final exam time unless the student notifies the instructor prior to the exam and receives written approval from the instructor.
